Dear Friends,

At this time last year, we were entering new territory, with no idea when we might begin to see our way out of the COVID-19 pandemic. We hope this summer you were able to experience at least a few moments of a return to normality, although the news continues to change daily. We wish we could report that conditions for our friends and colleagues in Guatemala are showing improvement, but unfortunately, vaccines are slow to be distributed outside the cities, and remote learning is still the reality for many students.

Your donations over the last year for emergency relief efforts and scholarships have provided students and their families with the support and tools they needed to persevere. FOG provided over \$19,000 in Category 1 grants to 42 students for the 2021 school year. RPCV sponsors raised an additional \$44,000 for 111 Category 2 scholarships. By year's end, FOG had collected and donated \$9,000 for covid relief efforts, including emergency food, medical supplies, and aid to families.

The most important thing that your support provides is HOPE—hope for a future that keeps these students from giving up, dropping out, or worse, leaving their homes. With the recent focus on addressing the root causes of migration by helping Guatemalans find hope at home, I am reminded that since our beginning, FOG's mission has been to support local communities and their future leaders **where they live.** While addressing root causes is a complex task, **education** is clearly a key.
